Keynote Speaker DARNESHIA ALLEN

Darneshia Allen has more than 29 years of experience working with young children, including intensive work



with families in urban communities, and years of experience in early care and education. She joined ZERO TO THREE, a national nonprofit that focuses on the science of early childhood development, in 2009. She is Manager of Training and Technical Assistance Integration for the organization's Safe Babies program, which works to prevent the maltreatment of babies and toddlers and to keep families together. She has spoken regularly at state and national infant mental health and early childhood conferences.





Keynote Speaker DR. JACK SHONKOFF

Jack P. Shonkoff, MD, is the Julius B. Richmond FAMRI Professor of Child Health and Development at the Harvard



Chan School of Public Health and Harvard Graduate School of Education; Professor of Pediatrics at Harvard Medical School and Boston Children's Hospital; and Founding Director of the universitywide Center on the Developing Child. He currently directs a new initiative titled Connecting Science + Community (CSC) whose aim is to achieve greater impacts on current well-being and future life outcomes for children experiencing poverty, economic insecurity, racism and/or other structural inequities. CSC's strategy draws on advances in the science of early childhood development (ECD 2.0), lessons learned from direct services for young children and the adults who care for them, and deeper engagement in place-based investments through an early childhood lens.





MHERE WE BEGIN: HARNESSING RELATIONSHIPS TO FOSTER COLLABORATION



Darneshia Allen, Manager of Training and Technical Assistance Integration, ZERO TO THREE Safe Babies



This session will capture the value of shared knowledge and experience in cross-sector work with young children and their families. Participants will engage in a simulation and discussions with an emphasis on strategic considerations for strengthening collaborations as well as insights that promote family engagement. Through this session, audience members will draw connections among ideas shared to enhance relationship-building at the family and community level, to increase quality and access across the spectrum of care and improve outcomes for young children and families.

Darneshia Allen has more than three decades of experience in supporting safety, nurturing strong foundations for healthy development and prioritizing the well-being of infants and toddlers affected by early adversity. She has worked closely with state and national organizations to support equitable and intensive engagement with families in early childhood systems in rural and urban communities.

Alonzo Patterson III, MD, has served children and families as a general pediatrician for over 30 years, mostly in West Dayton. He also serves as

the Chief Medical Health Equity officer for Dayton Children's Hospital and is on several community boards.

After serving in local public health departments as a health educator and accreditation coordinator, **Ashley Steveley** came to Dayton Children's Hospital to lead several initiatives. As a public health professional, she works daily to improve the quality of life of the residents in the community she serves.

Storytelling is a powerful tool for fostering social-emotional resilience, personal empowerment and community connection. This session will equip participants with techniques to use storytelling in classrooms and other settings to strengthen relationships and promote a sense of belonging.

Kayla Hairston holds a master's degree in public health from Wright State University and focuses her efforts on ensuring that children and families receive the mental health support they need, starting from the earliest years of

life. She volunteers as the Self-Care Subcommittee Co-chair for Montgomery County's Prevention Coalition.

Magen Wright holds a bachelor's degree in maternal child health and a master's in social work. She has experience working with families from various backgrounds, including military, deaf/hard of hearing, Kids of Deaf Adults (KODAs), foster care and families working towards reunification.

SPREADING HOPE: HEALTHY OUTCOMES FROM POSITIVE EXPERIENCES

Using the Four Building Blocks of HOPE, Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences, participants will learn how positive childhood experiences (PCEs) help mitigate the effects of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs). These positive experiences are essential for driving healthy child development and can lessen the lifelong effects of ACEs.

Melanie Estes is the Program Director for the Community Health and Resilience Initiative, which focuses on children who have been exposed

to trauma. She is a HOPE Champion and trainer of facilitators, working to mitigate Adverse Childhood Experiences through mental health prevention and promotion.

Mindy Nickles has been working with children and families for almost 20 years. She is a part-time certified Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral therapist for an outpatient mental health agency, providing intake and assessment and counseling services.
