The **Community Health Improvement Plan** is a three-year community-driven plan that outlines goals, objectives, and strategies that will be used by task forces, coalitions, organizations, and citizens to help improve the community's health.

Maternal & Infant Vitality



GOAL 1: All babies in Montgomery County will be born healthy and celebrate their first birthday.

- ↓ Reduce the overall infant mortality rate
- ↓ Decrease the low birthweight rate
- ↑ Increase the percent of birthing people who report breastfeeding at hospital discharge
- ↓ Reduce the rate of infant sleep-related death
- ↓ Decrease the percent of birthing people who report smoking while pregnant
- ↑ Increase the percent of birthing people who receive adequate prenatal care

Chronic Disease Prevention



GOAL 1: All Montgomery County residents will have improved physical, social, and affordable access to sufficient, safe, and nutritious foods that meet their food preferences and dietary needs for an active and healthy life.

GOAL 2: All Montgomery County families will have access to safe, accessible, and affordable locations to participate in activities to increase physical activity.

- ↓ Decrease the overall food insecurity rate
- ↓ Decrease the child (<18 years) food insecurity rate
- ↑ Increase the number of pounds of food waste diverted
- ↑ Increase the amount of dollars spent on healthy food sales by Produce Perks customers
- ↑ Increase the percent of adults who report doing physical activity or exercise during the past 30 days other than for their regular job

Behavioral Health



GOAL 1: Montgomery County residents will have access to treatment and community support programs for mental health and/or substance misuse.

GOAL 2: The behavioral health of Montgomery County residents, which affects overall well-being, will be supported through education and increased access to prevention services.

GOAL 3: Fewer overdose deaths will occur in Montgomery County.

- ↓ Reduce the rate of substance misuse-related hospital visits
- ↓ Reduce the percentage of adults who report binge drinking
- ↓ Decrease the suicide death rate
- ↑ Increase the number of mental health providers per population
- ↑ Increase the number of peer supporters employed by Montgomery County agencies
- ↓ Decrease the number of overdose deaths in Montgomery County
- ↓ Reduce the rate of emergency department visits due to an overdose by Montgomery County residents

MINORITY HEALTH DISPARITIES



Health disparities are health differences that are linked to social, economic, and environmental disadvantage.

They can negatively affect groups of people based on their race, ethnicity, religion, socioeconomic status, gender, age, mental health, disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity.



Some health disparities that exist in Montgomery County, Ohio include:



Black individuals die from **Heart Disease** at a rate nearly 1.5x higher than the average Montgomery County resident.



Individuals who identify as **Black** die 2x more often from **Kidney Disease** than White individuals in Montgomery County.



Black individuals were diagnosed with **Prostate cancer** at a rate 1.5x higher than White individuals.



In 2022, the rate of new **HIV diagnosis** was almost 6x higher among **Black** individuals when compared to White.



New cases of **Chlamydia** were diagnosed at a rate 7x higher among **Blacks**.



Homicide deaths occur at a rate 6.5x more often among **Black** individuals.



Infant Mortality: Black babies die at a rate of 3x that of white babies.

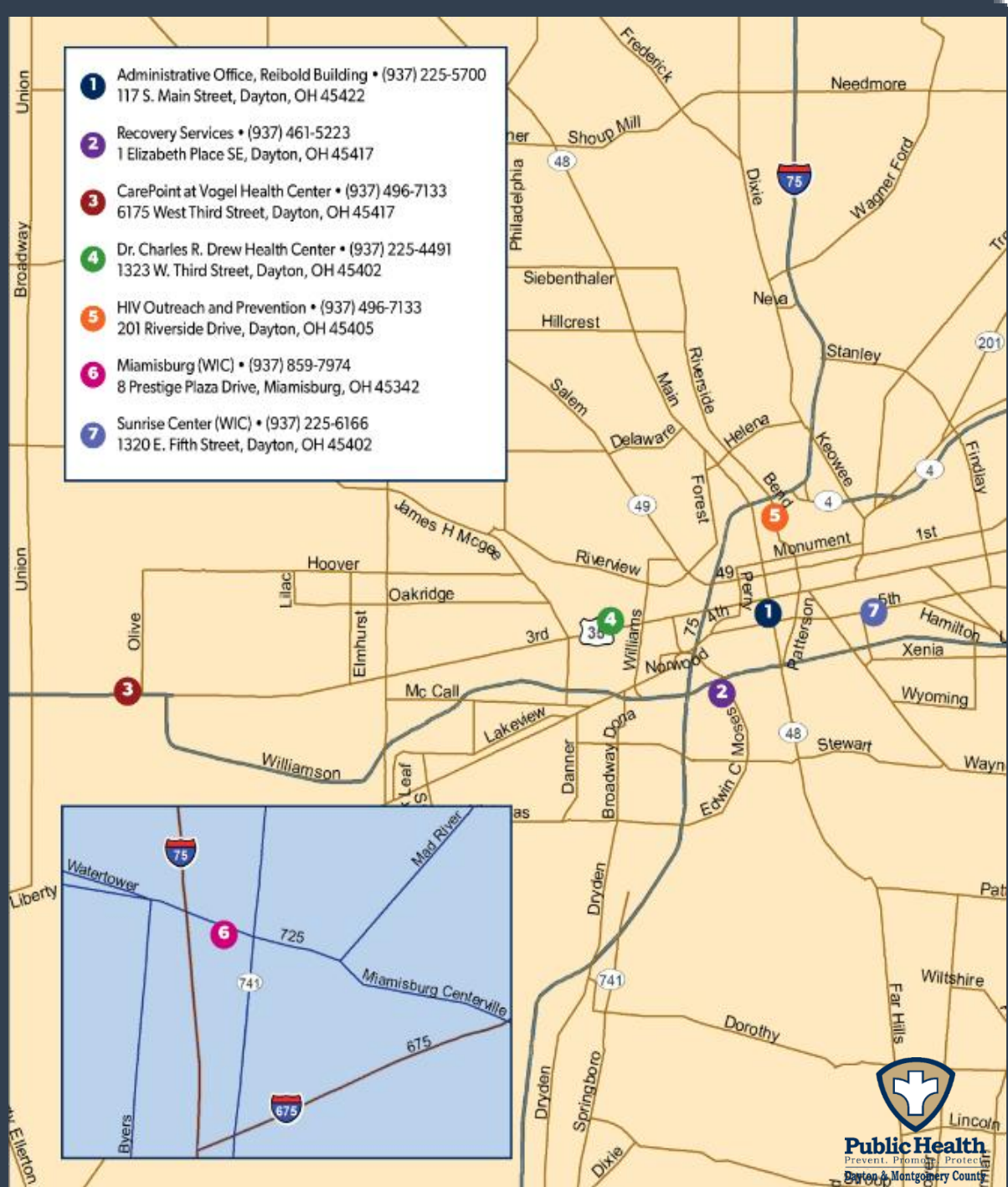
Public Health services range from daily activities such as restaurant inspections and birth and death certificates. To unique life-event services such as emergency response and HIV testing.
